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
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ANALYSIS OF AND RESPONSES TO EXTREMIST

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
In Autumn **2023 ARENAS published** two living documents critical to the **strategic development of the project**.




First, the ARENAS Data Management Plan (DMP) which was created in Work Package 1, led by Julien Longhi of CY Cergy Paris Université. The Data Management Plan is due to identify all data collected, processed and/or generated by the project, analyse their main generators and users, and define how data is handled and stored during and after the project.

The second document published was the Plan for Communications, Dissemination and Exploitation (PCDE) which was produced by Work Package 7 Leaders Momentum. It sets out our ambition to craft and implement a robust and sustained planned dissemination campaign through the 48 months of the project.

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BARCELONA HOSTS ARENAS SEMINAR

- INSIDE EXTREMIST NARRATIVES

The Centre of Studies on Democracies and Dictatorships (CEDID) of the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona (UAB) organised a **seminar on 24 November 2023** linked with the research of the Work Package 3 that studied the **historical roots and circulations of extremist narratives**. Moderated by Steven Forti (UAB), leader of the ARENAS WP3, the seminar, entitled *Inside Extremist Narratives*, featured presentations by consortium members representing four partners within the ARENAS project.

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Participants included members of this Work Package: the researchers from Düsseldorf, Julien Longhi from the CY Cergy Paris Université and Darja Fišer and Kristina Pahor de Maiti of the Inštitut za Novejšo Zgodovino. Furthermore, some PhD students presented their doctoral dissertations which also deal with the topic of extremism: Andreas Blombach, Phillip Heinrich, Fabian Schäfer and Tamara Fuchs from the Friedrich Alexander University in Erlangen-Nürnberg, Mara Nogai from the University of Düsseldorf and Karolina Küsters from the University Bonn.

Some researchers from Departments of German Studies at other universities also presented their research work on extremism and narratives: Friedemann Vogel and Fabian Deus from the University Siegen, Noah Bubenhofer from the University Zürich and Sebastian Zollner from the University Greifswald.

The research focuses on corpus linguistic, sociolinguistic, discourse linguistic and computer linguistic analysis, the corpora are composed of different languages so that it is possible to compare the situation of extremis discourses and narratives inside Europe, or rather with other parts of the world (e.g. Japan).



The workshop was also open to any other interested students, who were able to gain ideas and inspiration for their final theses from the presentations.

UNIVERSITY OF HELSINKI



The Fourth Helsinki Conference on Emotions, Populism, and Polarised Politics (HEPP4) was held on 11-13 December 2023.

at the University of Helsinki.



The Conference assembled a wide range of international researchers at all career stages, to examine populism, polarisation, and emotions, particularly from a discursive and cultural approach. It included contributions from a wide range of fields. There were 170 presenters and more than 200 participants from various parts of Europe, as well as attendees from Brazil, Australia, Argentina, India, South Africa, Nigeria, and the United States.

The **keynote speakers** were prominent scholars on discursive approaches to populism and nationalism; Benjamin DeCleen, Hande Eslen-Ziya and Mercedes Barros, who, throughout her visit to Helsinki, also gave a Christina seminar talk and doctoral course at the UH *Dirty Words: Feminism, populism and hegemony.*

Members of the ARENAS project consortium participated in a panel discussion on "The circulation of narratives, doxae, and implicit meanings in populist discourse". The panel discussed how narratives, doxas, and implicit meanings, which are

important linguistic and discursive elements of populist discourse, are circulated across times, spaces, and media. The panel started with an overview of theorisations of circulation in post-structuralist continental thought through the prism of performativity (Simo Määttä, University of Helsinki). Subsequently, Samuel Vernet (Aix-Marseille Université) analysed the circulation of doxa in the most listened-to radio news program in France reporting the invasion of the US Capitol by pro-Trump protesters on January 7, 2021.

Julien Longhi (CY Cergy Paris Université) discussed the ethos, authority, and legitimacy of the "scientific leader" in the circulation of conspiratorial discourse about COVID-19. Mattia Retta (University of Helsinki) analysed the circulation of hate speech through implicit meanings in the tweets of Italian extremeright politicians.

WEBINAR CYCLE ON

HISTORICAL ROOT OF

EXTREMIST NARRATIVES

Within the framework of the **ARENAS**project, Work Package 3 (WP3),
coordinated by Steven Forti from the
Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona (UAB),
deals with the study of the historical roots
of extremist narratives and their circulation
in the political and media spheres.





The research and activities of WP3 are carried out throughout the four years of the ARENAS project and involve teams from the UAB, CY Cergy Paris Université, the University of Helsinki and the Institute of Contemporary History of Ljubljana.

What are the main extremist narratives existing in the countries studied? When did they originate? How have they been reused over time? Currently, what is new and what remains? Can we find common patterns at the European level? Could we talk about transnational circulation? These are some of the questions to which answers will be offered.

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The International Research Group **DRAINE**(Hate and Social Disruption: Discourse and Performativity) recently hosted a seminar in Pisa, Italy. This recent seminar, the sixth organised by DRAINE, took place in January and was attended by about 30 participants from universities and countries across Europe. Attendees included 8 members of the ARENAS project consortium.

The focus of the seminar was on the relationship between hatred, discursive corporealities and subversive practices of the body. To further build on the work of the fifth seminar, which was held in Brussels in 2023 the seminar considered reparative discourses, between discursive corporeality and institutional speech-making.

The topics explored were as follows

TOPIC 01

Making bodies visible and audible

TOPIC 02

Institutional reparative discourse

TOPIC 03

Hate as Resistance and Empowerment



The most recent Annual Meeting of the German Society for Linguistics (DGfS) took place at Ruhr-Universität Bochum (RUB) between 28 February and 01 March 2024. ARENAS consortium members from HHU Düsseldorf and CY Cergy Paris Université participated in the conference.



A total of 14 workshops and 4 plenary talks investigated language from a variety of perspectives. The theme of the conference – Language and Attitude – focused on one of the most crucial functions of language. Language is one of the most important, probably even the most important means to express attitudes, personal attitudes such as desires, needs, or preferences and public attitudes such as political beliefs.

One of the 14 Workshops, "The language of extremist narratives: cross-disciplinary approaches", was organised by Ana Yara Postigo Fuentes, Stefan Hartmann, Rolf Kailuweit, Alexander Ziem from HHU Düsseldorf, who are members of the ARENAS consortium.



For this reason, ARENAS partnered with the international network <u>Schools Beyond Regions and Borders (SBRB)</u> to present the seminar series titled "Empowering Young People Against Hate Speech."

Launched in February 2021, the SBRB project aims to foster an understanding of civic and citizenship competence among secondary school students, encouraging them to actively engage as leaders within their communities. Beyond this central goal, SBRB endeavours to cultivate a strong sense of

belonging to the European community among its participants, fostering unity and inclusivity for future generations.

Through a comprehensive approach integrating education, engagement, and empowerment, SBRB equips young individuals with the knowledge, skills, and values necessary to navigate and positively impact the complex socio-political landscape of today and tomorrow.

ARENAS Involvement in Seminar Series

The seminar series was held from October 2023 to January 2024 and featured ARENAS members addressing various aspects of hate speech and other forms of extreme narratives, including their historical evolution, identification in online discourse, ethical considerations, and strategies for mediation and remediation. The series began with Steven Forti from the Autonomous University of

Barcelona, providing a historical perspective on extremist narratives. Subsequent lectures by Julien Longhi (CY Cergy Paris Université), Katalin Miklóssy (University of Helsinki), and Béatrice Fracchiolla (University of Lorraine) explored the spread of extremist narratives online, ethics in democracy, and methods for mediating hate speech, respectively.

Increased polarisation triggered by social protest movements, the COVID-19 crisis and the war in Ukraine has challenged European democracies and fostered extremist narratives, with strong and numerous consequences for citizens, politics, and the democratic exercise.




European citizens are facing the "post-truth" world, characterised by conspiracy theories, overwhelming disinformation, fake news and more and more extremist narratives. As Europeans prepare to vote in the European Parliament elections in June it is crucial that we carefully interrogate extremist narratives.

This is the work we are carrying out as part of the ARENAS project. The full project title is "Analysis of and Responses to Extremist Narratives. The ARENAS consortium focuses on extremist narratives as crucial nexuses, because "the battle of stories, not the debate on issues" can determine how citizens react to political events (Cornog 2014). Extremist narratives constitute counter-narratives in the sense that they challenge mainstream worldviews and mainstream interpretations of periods of social change and major events. Extensive work has been carried out by the ARENAS consortium on creating definitions of extremist narratives.

Actively questioning and challenging extremist narratives helps safeguard democracy, maintain trust, and promote informed decision-making during European elections. <u>Visit our website</u> where we outline the importance of analysing and interrogating extremist narratives.


